After saying good-bye to quite a number of staff that left HCS last spring, we welcome the new employees to the district:



Nhung Dinh is the new Test Coordinator, High School and Middle School Art teacher, and one of the school counselors. She comes here from Sitka where she has lived for the last six years; in Sitka she ran the tutorials program at Mt. Edgecumbe HS, taught ceramics at Sitka Fine Arts Camp, and worked at the Sitka Tribal Tannery. Her educational background includes degrees in Reading from UAS and

Psychology from UC Santa Cruz. She is currently completing a Masters in Education program with Framingham State College. Nhung has also studied art in France and Mexico. While she is here in Hoonah, Nhung would like to start programs in tanning, ceramics and silkscreen.



Bonnie Harris is our new High School and Middle School English teacher. She is also teaching High School Band. She most recently taught in Cordova, where she was the K-12 music teacher. Bonnie has lived in southeast Alaska for most of her life, most of it in Sitka: she grew up in Juneau, moved to Gustavus after high school and built a cabin there. She

has a BA in Music Education from Western Washington University and a Reading Specialist Masters Degree from UAS. When asked what she would like to do as a teacher here, she said, *"I would like to challenge students to step out of their usual comfort zones a bit and use their creative spirits for making something new and good in their lives, to do some things they've not tried before."*



Steve Berry is one of our new Special Education teachers. He just moved here from the Los Angeles area where he taught in the same specialty. Steve grew up in Las Vegas, NV, where he also attended college, as well as in Utah, Indiana, and L.A. Steve has a daughter in Las Vegas, and a son who recently moved to

Australia. His early impressions of our kids and our community? *"The students here are fantastic. Most seem*

to value their education, which is a change from my previous teaching experience. The community has seemed very welcoming."

Steve recently completed the coursework for the BCBA (Board Certified Behavior Analyst.) He would like to complete his supervision hours as well as get his BCBA certificate. He is also looking at Doctorate program as a possibility for the future.

where she earned a BA in Education.

Elena and her husband Marc, also a teacher, are enjoying getting to know Hoonah. When they aren't at work, they like to go berry picking, fishing, and taking drives out to Freshwater Bay. Elena says that she especially enjoys the beautiful scenery and wilderness surrounding Hoonah. She finds it amazing that she can see whales so often just by looking out over the water. She also is impressed that Hoonah Schools offers Tlingit language to the students.

New Staff, continued.

Patrick Malone is the new Science teacher for Middle School and High School. His story follows:

I have wandered through six countries, and ultimately gleaned several degrees from 5 universities and colleges before working at Genentech as a research assistant. Later, I took a faculty position at



the UCSF School of Medicine, Department of Neurology, under Nobel laureate Dr. Stanley Prusiner, engaged in laboratory transgenics work to support Dr. Pruisner's ongoing prion studies ("Mad Cow disease" and the inherited variety known as Creutzfeldt-Jakob Disease).

In the past few years I have enjoyed amazing opportunities at the Chimpanzee and Human Communication Institute, The National Chimpanzee Sanctuary System - Chimp Haven, and enjoyed valuable conversations with Dr. Jane Goodall. I have provided scientific consultation with the Gorilla Foundation in support of Koko the gorilla, famous for her excellent use of sign language, and I have conducted research at Chimp Haven. I have also presented some of my research into the gene-gender-environment link at the Western Psychological Association, the Autism Society of America, and the American Psychological Association.

I found great satisfaction working with the J.A.C.K. chimpanzee sanctuary in the Democratic Republic of Congo where I provided on-going support for the first clearly DSM-IV diagnostic autistic chimpanzee Elia. This work was presented at the Autism Society with great interest and appreciation, and you may enjoy video documentation of this effort by using the following web link:<http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=qZ-Pq6slH3Q>

I am currently working to complete a neurobiological study of nonhuman primate infant and toddler developmental neurogenetics through which I demonstrate the connection between human brain evolution and the rise of developmental disorder. Chimpanzee young raised in captivity invariably grow to display behaviors analogous to institutionalized children, and these behaviors may ultimately grow to resemble an ASD or even PTSD. This study will greatly inform future prevention and medical treatment of disordered development in both chimpanzee and human children. In 2013 I provided an invited lecture detailing my research work at Sidney Sussex College, University of Cambridge.

I am most recently from Klamath Falls, Oregon where I taught mathematics at Klamath Union High School and Advanced Multivariate Statistics as a professor of mathematics at Klamath Community College. It is my facility with very advanced statistical methods that led to my continuing climate research that I enjoy in cooperation with several research institutions, including the Environmental Change Institute at the University of Oxford, and the Arctic Research Consortium of the United States (ARCUS).

I grew up in Corvallis, Oregon and spent a great deal of my time in the surrounding Cascade Mountains and all along the Oregon coast. The Pacific Northwest coastal geology and weather are essentially identical to what I find living in Hoonah, so bringing my family to this community feels very much like a homecoming. My wife, Amber Malone, and I have sought someplace special to put down our roots and look forward to raising our son, Keagan, within this amazing community.

Marc Leinberger has taken the job of math teacher for the Middle School and High School. He has come here from Bethel, where he worked as the Lower Kuskokwim Career and Technical Education Specialist, which included: Teaching high school level applied mathematics by live two-way videoconferencing; developing school district and school CTE courses & curriculum; leading professional development for teachers; and coordinating the K-12 Junior FIRST Lego League, FIRST Lego League and FIRST Tech Challenge robotics program for over 50 teams.

Marc was born in Illinois and lived there until age 10. His family then moved to Kotzebue and then Barrow (his parents were bush teachers in the Arctic for 20 years). After graduating from Barrow, he completed his Bachelor's degree at UAF. He has taught in rural Alaska communities on Kodiak Island and southwest Alaska for the past 23 years before moving to Hoonah.

Marc's wife, Elena, is a teacher in Hoonah as well. She is full-blooded Yupi'ik. Together they have four children: Cingarkaq, Luke, Katherine and Donovan. Donovan is a kindergartener in Hoonah. The older three are attending UAA or finishing senior year in Sitka. They love to travel, do subsistence activities and be outdoors when they have family time together.

When asked about his early impressions of Hoonah, Marc says: *"Hoonah is a great small town! Everyone is very nice and has been helpful as I get acquainted with businesses, the environment and learn local traditions like the July 4th celebration, Tlingit culture, and seasonal fishing times."*

And what would he like to accomplish in the near future? *"My greatest accomplishments would be to live in harmony with my family and community while helping students set and reach goals to become responsible adults. I would like to learn Tlingit language and how the local environment and culture are connected."*



Aimee Smith is a new Special Education Teacher & Elementary/Middle School Music Teacher. She comes here from Sitka, where she taught special education in the Sitka School District for the past two years.

Her hometown is Brooks, Oregon, near Salem. She holds a B.A. in Music - with concentrations in theory/composition and music education from George Fox University. She also holds an M.A. in Teaching and graduate endorsement in Special Education from Willamette University. Aimee most recently studied preschool special education at UAS.

When asked about her family, Aimee said that her

dad's family is of Cherokee, Choctaw and Blackfoot lineage. Her grandparents on her mother's side were both born and raised in Juneau before moving to Oregon. Both of her great-grandfathers worked in the mines, and one of them owned Carson's Bakery and worked on the M/V Taku as a baker during its maiden voyage. Although her family is still in Oregon, she feels at home in southeast Alaska.

Outside of school, Aimee is a music composer and has had her work performed in Oregon, Alaska, New York and Spain. Writing and exploring how to create with sound is one of her passions. She also loves to dance and began dancing ballet again a year ago.

Aimee has found Hoonah to be very friendly and welcoming. She loves waving to people as she drives through town or seeing her students at the store. She says that the students are very creative, willing to learn and willing to teach her when the opportunity arises. She looks forward to growing with them this year.

As for her goals for the near future, Aimee is interested in getting her music therapy certification and studying music and neurological/linguistic development. She started studying Tlingit in June and is looking forward to deepening what she is learning and using it in her classroom. Her Tlingit name is Át'kaheení .

Tlingit Study Group for All Ages

Some weeks we don't meet due to scheduling conflicts and travel commitments. We will start up again in January after a break for the holidays. Esther Greenwald: Hoonah's First Librarian



Esther Greenwald came to Hoonah as a teacher from Colorado in 1948. She worked at the school as a committed, sincere and successful teacher for about 20 years before becoming the librarian. Esther said her favorite part about being a librarian was being able to get reacquainted with former students she had taught since kindergarten.

Esther set up the library, gathering books from the elementary teacher's classroom libraries. The Hoonah library began with a small collection of grouped books. In 1971, when the cafeteria building was built it was decided that the upstairs would be the library. From there, it was organized and cataloging cards were put in place. The next year high school books were added. Esther's vision and ability to make that a reality, created our library.

She also made sure the library had games like "Go Fish" for kids to learn from. It became a place for kids to go. Upon Esther's retirement in 1976 the library was named after her. Esther shared that working as the librarian, "Was a very interesting and fun time. I felt I could expose kids to a variety of other things outside of the classroom." Esther Greenwald's dedication, passion and love for our students is all part of the legacy she created. This spring will mark 40 years of honoring Hoonah's first librarian with our library carrying her name. *Thank you to Amelia Wilson, our current librarian, for this article.*

News From Hoonah High School and Middle School

Greetings from Room 414, old-new home for Stephanie Harold. Here Middle School Language Arts is learning about Signposts in Reading -- which are features of a narrative that give clues about theme, character development, and various levels of conflict. Meanwhile, the World Literature class is exploring the word parts acquired from the many cultures that contributed to the English language we speak today. World Literature is also heading off into an exploration of mythology, connecting the stories of ancient heroes with Tlingit oral history. Finally, Spanish 1 (actually being taught in the Science Room) is a fiesta of storytelling, singing, and even circle time with picture books and cookies!



Math Department: Greetings! This is an exciting time of year when I am able to get to know each student as an individual and his/her current math skills. Secondary students completed an initial diagnostic math assessment the first week of school. Middle school and high school students have been learning and applying teamwork, persistence and problem solving skills in all math classes so far this semester. These three skills are critical not only for acquiring new math concepts, but also throughout life. Middle school students have participated in math games such as Factor Captor and The Product Game to practice multiplication and division skills. High schools students have played Battleship on Cartesian planes, created unique designs through Stick Stack, played advanced Factor Captor among other activities. Parents should have received a syllabus to sign for each high school math class, as a take-home assignment.

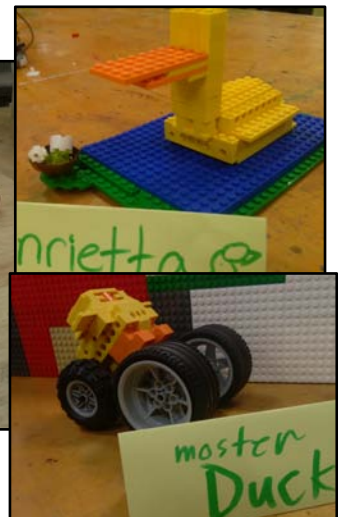

Cultural Leadership Club Offered for High School Students



Hoonah City Schools is proud to offer the high school Cultural Leadership Club for students in grades 9-12 again this year. The goal of the club is to support the academic achievement and personal success for students by encouraging and fostering youth leadership, community and civic engagement and the practice of culture,

values and traditions.

The club fosters friendship among students and serves to represent the students at Hoonah High School through political, social and cultural activities, and to promote goodwill between the high school community and the community at large. The cultural leadership club aims to provide students the opportunity to gather and celebrate their culture and traditions.

The club will meet twice a month. Each semester club members will engage in a service project. For example, students will lead a community event during Native American month in November. In April, students will formally assist with the School *Ku.éex'*. In addition to these large events, upon club member determination and consensus, we will meet on evenings, weekends or during breaks and host events for all students.

Upcoming club trips include an ISP- sponsored trip for four students and club advisor to attend the Alaska Travel Industry Association's convention in Juneau to participate in the Arts, Culture & Heritage Tourism Summit to be held at the Walter Sobeloff Center. Huna Totem Corporation and Huna Heritage Foundation are supportive of our students, club and what we aim to accomplish for our youth. By partnering with these and other organizations like the Hoonah Indian Association, we hope to provide engaging, inspiring and real-life opportunities to set our youth up to take on the leadership roles and positions within our community, corporation and state.

We are also very excited to again take students to the 2015 Elder's and Youth Conference and AFN gathering in Anchorage. The conference strengthens the knowledge and self-confidence of Native people to speak out and to create change within themselves and in their communities. It celebrates the Alaska Native intellect. And, it encourages young people and Elders alike to pursue the great task of maintaining our traditional Native values and practices, while thriving in the modern world.

Leadership club members will be selected for trips through an application process. School eligibility will apply in addition to active participation in club sponsored meetings and events. Preference will be given to upper classmen. Club advisor, Amelia Wilson welcomes parents, families, community members and businesses to advise, volunteer and support club efforts to uplift our youth as they develop their leadership path.

Chautauqua Report *from Local Coordinator Amelia Wilson*

The New Old Time Chautauqua "circus" group that came to Hoonah this summer was amazing! This non-profit organization travels all over, bringing rural communities laughter, joy and entertainment. They provided fun workshops on things like juggling and acrobatics, did a parade through town and put on an awesome "big show" with a packed gym. All \$1,064 of the ticket sales was donated to our ANB Hall Fund.

In addition to their top-notch entertainment, the group performed service work including cleaning the ANB hall and the graveyard by the ferry terminal. They also did a special show at the Senior Center for our elders. What a blessing Chautauqua was to our community!

I was grateful for the opportunity to be the local coordinator and get to know the group. I am excited to work with the **elementary and middle school** students this year in music class. We have been busy at work figuring out where students are at in their musical journey and exploring their interests. The elementary students have learned several songs and games thus far. We started with "Waa Sa Iduwasaakw?", a Tlingit song, to learn each other's names. We sang a song about fishing and even went on a bear hunt! We had a great discussion about what things you might find in the forest if you are hunting bears and talked about why you don't run from them. Students were very articulate in sharing what they know. They even worked in teams to make pictures and we used them in our song. The students have been focusing on two concepts recently, steady beat and loud vs. soft. We created a "Loud-O-Meter" on the board and used it to practice. We are currently learning a song called "Sing! Speak! Whisper! Shout!" to learn about the different types of voices we can have. We worked on individual assessments during September. Please come in to the music room to see the list of songs and games that we have learned in each class, and watch it grow throughout the year!

The middle school students have been working on things such as staccato articulation and learning how to tune and balance by ear. We have been rehearsing a march called "American Patrol" and it has been great to watch the band improve over the past few weeks. We have also sight read some pieces and listened to possibilities for later this year. In early September, we began looking at individual student plans to map out their personal growth as a musician. We also started some small ensemble work. Watch for our new music journals to be coming home as well as instruments for practice. They will be listing their homework in their music journals. All parents should have received a music letter that students and parents are asked to read and sign. If you haven't seen it, contact me and I can provide you a new one.

I look forward to meeting all of you and working with your students as they develop their musical knowledge, appreciation, and skill.


Late-Breaking Music News:

News from the Elementary Classrooms

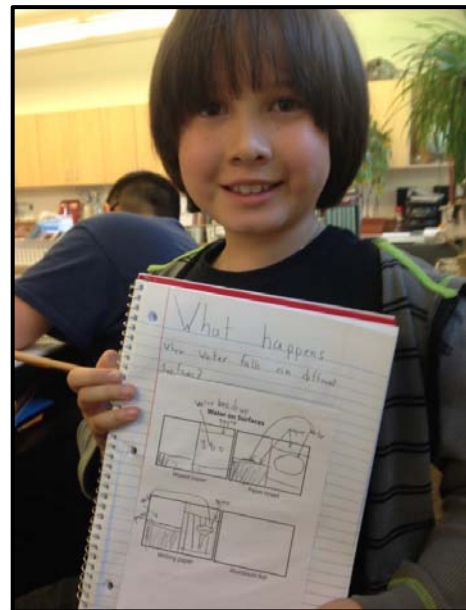
For the first part of the year, the **3rd and 4th grade class** have been focusing in Science on a unique Earth material: water. Water is the only material on Earth that occurs naturally in all three states of matter: solid, liquid, and gas. One of the goals with this unit is to help students to begin seeing water in a new light. Through their investigations into the properties of water, they



have begun to appreciate how important this natural resource is! The class conducted an investigation to observe what happens when water falls on 4 different surfaces, (aluminum foil, paper towels, writing paper, and wax paper,) and observed how "surface tension" can cause a large amount of water to stay pooled up on a penny. Mary Beth Moss, Johan and Leah brought in some water bugs from the muskegs for us to observe. These insects are able to stay afloat because of surface tension! We are looking forward to more investigations with this precious resource!

We are utilizing the Bridge's math program, which utilizes several models to represent mathematical thinking. The students have been busy building and demonstrating their thinking through tile arrays, ratio tables, and number lines. If you stop by our room, you will see lots of our thinking hanging up and you might even catch a glimpse of our math models on the floor in the back of the room. We hope that our love of math is felt by all who come into our room.



On another note, we are busy with our first Unit of Inquiry. We learned that to inquire means to ask thought provoking questions and that is our goal as we venture out to learn more about Colonial America. We are busy reading and writing about the earliest European settlements, building our background knowledge so that we can reconstruct a thriving colony in our own classroom over the next several weeks. In order to make this project possible, we are looking for large pieces of cardboard and other recycled goods that can be made into storefronts for our village. Each student will be assigned a character and trade within the village and will be asked to take on the persona of a colonial settler. In addition to recycled materials, we are also looking for volunteers to help with the design and painting of storefronts. Hoonah Indian Association Culture Camps Held Summer and Fall 2015

Hoonah Indian Association (HIA) has held three Culture Camps which focused on strengthening and enhancing cultural identity through customary and traditional ways of life. The first camp was in July, and we hope to have one more camp held October 22-23. The camps have been for ages 12-17, and have been well attended; we have some amazing young people that were willing to come and learn various aspects of our diverse Tlingit Culture.

Some of the fantastic cultural activities that took place were: traditional ways of fishing, cooking fry bread and halibut chowder, picking and canning blueberries, making náayadi (half-dried fish), making and canning smoked strips, carving dance paddles, singing Tlingit songs and dancing, and learning more Tlingit language, history and protocol.

During the July session, we camped overnight on Hoonah Island. Activities during that camp included plant identification, safety and survival skills, how to clean a seal, and cooking fish underground.

Traditional Foods Program Update From Program Manager Kathy McCrobie

The SEARHC Traditional Foods Program has two regular events each week. On Mondays there is a fur sewing class. Larry Sanders started us off with a moccasin sewing class and there are still a few of us who are finishing up. To work on the seal and otter the participant must show proof of 25% blood quantum Alaska Native. This class is on Monday from 6-9 pm.

On Tuesday nights we have a regular beading group called "Just Bead It!". This class began in March and we have been meeting and beading every Tuesday evening. In September we hope to transition to a regalia class. The group meets from 7-9 pm at the William and Mary Johnson Youth Center. These classes are free and all supplies are provided. One of the goals of the Traditional Foods Program is to tap into these cultural traditions to develop skills that will enable folks to improve their economic capability where culture and business can thrive together.

Many people are still unaware that they can sell the jelly and jams that they make. There are many 'cottage foods' that can be made in your home to sell. You can learn more about it in an upcoming online class in October offered by UAF Cooperative Extension. "Starting and Operating a Specialty Food Business in Alaska". The cost for this 5 session, online class is only \$50.00. Check out the Sitka Local Foods Network website at <http://sitklocalfoodsnetwork.org/> where you can find more information about it and while you're there, read the blog about our own community garden.

For more information on cottage foods stop by and see me at the new Hoonah Indian Association Community Center in Room #1.

Our Wildberry Festival started off this year with a pancake breakfast. Gunalcheesh to Majors Kevin and Tina of the Salvation Army for hosting and to Clara Gray for setting up and serving a good breakfast. There was no cost for this breakfast, just a pledge to donate to your favorite local charity. The Wildberry Festival was almost rained out and it would have been if we weren't able to make the last minute change to hold it in the Youth Center. Thank you Kris Skaflestad for opening the doors there!

And thank you to all the volunteers who make this happen every year so our community can experience the wonderful celebration of our bountiful berries. Thank you to JJ Pate for donating 3 of her fragrant perfumes as prizes. The winner of the Jam Contest was Carlie Brown! She won a \$50.00 Visa gift card. She was our only food entrant and she brought the



most delicious raspberry jam! I think even if there were more entries, she still would have won. It looked, smelled and tasted so very raspberry!

With berry season still going (or with some of the berries now in your freezer) how about trying different ways to prepare them besides jellies, jams, and other sweets. Try this Blueberry basil vinegar recipe from the UAF Cooperative Extension:

Blueberry Basil Vinegar:

Combine 4 cups blueberries and 1 cup white wine vinegar in a glass bowl. Lightly crush blueberries and add 3 more cups of vinegar. Crush 1 cup basil and add to vinegar along with the zest from one lemon. Cover bowl with plastic wrap and let sit in a cool, dark place for 4 weeks, stirring every 2 or 3 days. Strain vinegar through several layers of cheesecloth.
